brothers and sisters. After several years she attended Wayne Normal School and the University of Nebraska.

Jim Collier and Hazel Muhm were married February 14, 1917, at the Muhm home north of Randolph. They moved to a farm near the Pearl Creek School and later to a farm nine miles north of Randolph where they resided for many years.

The children born to this couple were: Dorothy, twins Vera and Vena, Dean, Ruth and Hugh who died in infancy. The four oldest children graduated from Robbins School, District 94, where Jim served on the school board for many years. Ruth completed her eighth grade education at District 93.

Times were hard during the thirties. There was no rain, the hot winds blew and the grasshoppers came. Often the dust was so bad that at mid-day it was so dark that the lamps had to be lit. It was the job of the children to herd the cattle along the roads when the pastures were gone. The groceries and other necessities were purchased with money received from selling cream.

While the children were growing up, entertainment consisted of games played around the dining room table by the light of the kerosene lamp, neighborhood card parties attended by the entire family and house dances. In the winter it was time for sleigh riding followed by steaming cups of hot chocolate and cookies enjoyed around the coal stove. There wasn't a lot of money but everyone had a good time.

Dorothy, Vera and Vena graduated from Randolph High School. Dorothy and Vena taught in rural schools in Cedar County and later in California schools from which they retired. Vera worked in Sioux City and Fremont and later in a bank in Omaha.

Dean served with the United States Army on the European front during World War II. After his discharge he worked for telephone companies in Walthill, Norfolk and Omaha until his retirement. Ruth worked in Fremont and Sioux City and retired from the Postal Service in California.

Jim, Hazel and Ruth left the farm and moved to San Diego in 1942. Jim worked in a defense plant. Ruth graduated from Hoover High School, San Diego, California.

The Colliers returned to Nebraska in 1944 and Jim died in 1945. Hasel remained in Randolph until 1957 when she returned to California. She resided in California until her death in 1975.

In 1929, they moved to the Colling farm one-quarter of a mile southwest of Randolph which they bought from Nick's mother. For several years Nick rented extra land nearby. He enjoyed raising cattle and working the fields with a fast team of horses. In 1954, they moved into Randolph where he worked part-time at the Home Oil Company. After four years, Nick decided to go back to full time farming. They moved to a farm he

owned two miles south of Randolph where he built a dam he was very proud of.

In 1961, they moved to a smaller farm three-quarters of a mile north of Randolph, living there until 1968, when they retired and moved into a home close to the Catholic Church which made it easy for them to attend daily Mass.

The Collings had two daughters, Armella and Janelle. Armella was born February 15, 1930. Janelle was born May 9, 1934. Both girls graduated from St. Frances High School. To this couple, 14 children were born: Boyd, Vera, Dale, Velma, Eva, Aulda, Leila, Irma, Flo, Doris, Helen, Audrey, Wilma and Alice. One daughter, Aulda, passed away on June 6, 1942 at the age of 15.

Bill and Nina started farming with horses. They drove a horse with a buggy or bobsled through good and bad years. They purchased their first tractor in 1936 after the barn was struck by lightning and all the horses were killed in the fire.

Their first car purchased was a Model T Ford.

Good living was usually made milking cows, raising chickens and growing large gardens. They took cream and eggs to town once or twice a week to sell. Several hundred quarts of vegetables from the garden were canned. Five or six hogs and one or two beefs were butchered and processed so that it would feed the family through the winter.

Bill was director of country school District No. 93 from which all the children attended and graduated through the eighth grade.

Several of the school teachers spent bad winters with Bill and Nina. On cold winter days, parents of the children attending school took turns bringing kettles of soup for all the children at the school house. The school building no longer stands.

Through these years, many bushels of corn were picked by hand and oats were shocked and thrashed from the 400 acres William and the family farmed.

Nina made many stitches sewing all the clothes for her family. She also baked 12 loaves of bread every other day. She used 50 pounds of "Mother's Best" flour, qualifying here to get her picture in an advertisement for "Mother's Best Flour" in an issue of the *Nebraska Farmer*. The McLean's Store in Randolph was always happy to see Bill and Nina come to buy new shoes for their children at the beginning of the school year.

After all the years of hard work, Bill and Nina retired in Randolph and enjoyed their 43 grandchildren. All of their children married and most of them lived in the Randolph area.

Lloyd William Dunklau, born January 10, 1916 at Wayne, Nebraska and Lois Bernice Beckman, born July

24, 1919 at Wayne, Nebraska were married in Wayne, Nebraska on May 24, 1939.

They farmed northwest of Wayne for eight years before purchasing and moving to the farm six miles south and one and one-fourth miles east of Randolph in 1948. Lois and Lloyd were members of Redeemer Lutheran Church in Wayne and later joined St. John's Lutheran Church in Randolph.

The REA was not in the area yet, so Lloyd purchased a 32 volt Delco plant and wired the house for electricity. That same summer they purchased a gas refrigerator. Upon returning from town one day, they saw stakes were being set by the REA. It was an exciting day for them when it finally reached their house and the Delco plant could be removed.

When they moved to Randolph, they had three children: Loren Lloyd, Logene Lois and Linda Lavonne.

On January 31, 1949 Lynette Laurine was born. Lois always remembered the blizzard of 1948-49 for she had to be away from home three weeks before and three weeks after Lynette's birth. Lois and new baby were flown, by an airplane with snow runners, to her parents' farm northwest of Wayne and remained there for three weeks before returning home to the rest of the family.

A heavy snow storm November 11 blocked all roads and tore down our telephone line. Snow continued to plague them until they had 72 inches. A bobsled and two teams of horses belonging to Lloyd was the family's, and many of their neighbors', means of transporting eggs and cream to town. While in town they all purchased large supplies of groceries, fuel and medicine as needed.

One sunny morning Lloyd and several neighbor men took off for town. About noon, the wind came up and snow began to fall again. A wedding party from Sholes

got stuck on the closing roads, so the men pulled all the cars to safety. It was about 10:00 that evening, before they got to the last neighbor's, the snow was so blinding that Lloyd had to remain there until the next day before returning home. He was thankful that Loren had stayed with a neighbor, so he was not at home alone for such a stormy night.

In 1958, because of the teacher shortage, Lois decided to go back to college and renew her teaching certificate. She taught in Pierce County rural school district #60 for three years and the Sholes Public School for eight years. While teaching, Lois continued her education and graduated from Wayne State College with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1968. She took additional courses and later received a Special Learning Disability Endorsement. After graduation from Wayne State College, Lois began teaching in the Pierce Public School and taught there 13 years.



Henry George Engelbart was born April 20, 1883, at Oldenburg, Germany, to George H. and Helena Engelbart. Henry arrived in the United States with his parents, in September of 1891, at the age of eight years.

The Engelbart family first settled near Pender, Nebraska. Henry's father, George, was killed in the spring of 1892, when a wagon ran over him in a

runaway. At a young age, Henry worked out for his room and board and soon learned to support himself at many jobs. As a young man, Henry attended college at Fremont, Nebraska. He studied building design and construction.

On February 27, 1913, Henry married Emma Albrecht. Emma was the daughter of George and Mary (Hansen) Albrecht and was born March 8, 1894, on a farm near Pender.

Henry and Emma began farming near Pender and later moved to the farm south of Randolph, owned by Emma's father, George Albrecht. In March of 1918, Henry purchased the northwest quarter of this property. Henry and Emma lived on this farm until 1938, except for two

years that they lived in Randolph due to Emma's poor health. In 1938 they moved back into Randolph and their daughter, Alvena and her husband, Walt Wattier, moved on the farm.

In the winter of 1936 and 1937, the snow was so deep that they took the bob sled to go to town and often had to go through the fields because the roads were so drifted with snow. Often the family walked to the neighbors to play cards, since they couldn't get around by sled because of the drifted snow.

Henry often took his violin along with him on these trips so that there would be some music for entertainment at the parties. At these parties there were often house dances. The older folks would play cards while the younger folks danced.

In the year of 1936 there was no corn harvested, and for several years in the 30's there was no crops raised because of drought, hail and/or grasshoppers.

Henry died in March 1, 1948, while on a winter vacation in Salem, Oregon. Emma later married Gerd Johnson. Emma died July 31, 1966. Both Henry and Emma are buried at the Randolph City Cemetery.

The Engelbart farm is now owned by Henry and Emma's granddaughter, Ellen and her husband Richard Bermel. Henry and Emma's great-grandson Jeff and Vicky Bermel live on the farm. Submitted by Susie Wattier


